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Dear Kindergarten Parents,

Summer reading plays an important role in a student's academic growth. Helping our students to become skilled, thoughtful readers is one of the most important goals we have at Gatewood School. Like many things, the only way to become a better reader is through practice. We encourage families to spend at least ten to twenty minutes each day reading. Independent readers should read every day. The maintenance of reading skills is crucial to growth in all areas.

The purpose of our Summer Reading Program is to encourage reading for pleasure; to expose students to a variety of good literature; to provide rich, imaginative experiences; and to reinforce reading skills. Even after a child is able to read independently, it is still important for his/her to hear books read aloud. Additional reading throughout the summer is strongly encouraged.

Each student entering First Grade is expected to participate in Gatewood's Summer Reading. In addition to cultivating a love for reading and books, rising first graders should continue to maintain and grow their sight word banks. - include 3 good sentences with capital letters at the beginning and punctuation marks at the end.
- include a title.

Students may use the paper in the summer packet.

Summer Reading Assignment For students **entering** 1st Grade



We are using Book Adventure as part of our Summer reading requirement. Students will be reading books from the public library, e-books on personal devices, or purchased books, and then taking online quizzes. The goal is to help children learn to love reading and to maintain and grow current reading levels.

A list of suggested books that meets your child's independent/instructional reading level is being provided. The titles on the list are all on Book Adventure. You may choose additional books, but stay near the levels of the suggested titles and always check Book Adventure to be certain that your title can be found so that you may take a quiz and monitor comprehension. These books should be read independently, or with little assistance, as the lists have been designed to meet each student's current guided reading level.

Children should read as much as they want, but are required to take quizzes. Please help them pace themselves!

- Read and complete quizzes on at least 10 books (one quiz per week in June and July).

You will be provided with login information. Teachers will be able to log in and monitor progress periodically throughout the summer. Visit Book Adventure to access the many free resources.
